

#### CURRENT SCHOOL EXPENSES

The enrollment of pupils in the various schools is on the increase and the outlook is for a much larger school population in the future. North, East, and Flats schools are outstanding in enrollments. It is only a matter of time when facilities at the North and East Clarendon schools will have to be expanded.

Consolidation of several schools is possible and careful consideration should be given to this matter. This means the construction of a centralized building and it will depend on the present Legislature whether or not there will be State aid for such a project. It looks very much at present as if there would be. It will take time for sufficient investigation in order that the best possible plan can be pursued.

It has been very difficult to maintain a high educational standard throughout the whole country during World War II. We have lost approximately 200,000 teachers from the profession, who have entered other fields of labor during the past six years, and over 50,000 teachers are needed to reopen closed schools. This is due largely to much higher wages received from industry than the school systems.

The enrollment in teacher institutions is 50% of what it was before the war.

In order to properly finance the schools of the future there must be more state and federal aid. There can be no such thing as equal educational opportunities for all children without this aid.

One of the greatest national problems today is the provision of well trained teachers of a sufficient number for all educational institutions. The very existence of a nation is dependent on the training of its youth. This means that salaries of teachers must be comparable to those in other fields of labor or the schools will suffer.

Clarendon has been fortunate in maintaining good schools in general during the entire war period. It must be understood that the best efforts of all parties concerned are required in order to produce the greatest educational achievements.

Taking into consideration the difficulty in obtaining help, the school directors have done a good job in looking after repairs in all buildings. However, considerable work needs to be done on the building at the Flats. This building should be painted inside and out and the foundation repaired.

The potentialities of Clarendon are far above those of the average community, because of at least the two following reasons; first, it is one of the best farming communities in the State, and, second, its proximity to markets is rather exceptional.

This being my last report as superintendent of your schools, I wish to express my very sincere appreciation to the school directors for their invaluable services and encouragement, to the citizens, teachers, and pupils for the excellent and friendly cooperation during the past twenty-three years.

#### VERMONT OLD AGE ASSISTANCE DEPARTMENT

For the information of your taxpayers the customary annual statement is presented for your Town Report.

Payments of Old Age Assistance to persons applying from your town amounted to \$3,380.50 during the year January 1, 1946 to December 31, 1946. Payments for funeral expenses \$100.00.

The number of recipients in December, 1946 was 10; monthly payment \$340.00.

The maximum payment which can be made by this department is \$40.00 per month. In October, 1946 we were able to make payments above \$30.00 for the first time. This was due to an appropriation of \$50,000 by the special session of the legislature and a temporary change in the basis of federal matching. Congress authorized the Social Security Administration until December 31, 1947 to reimburse the States \$10.00 for the first \$15.00 paid. For the balance of the payment the old fifty-fifty matching basis is still in effect.

Many increases were made to meet cost of living budgets. Grants are practically up to date on current investigated applications. Intake has increased and is now on a prewar basis of about 100 applications per month.

- 13. Shall the Town Quota for all National Drives, such as Red Cross and U. S. O., be paid from the general fund?
- To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
